
Introduction

We are proud that Brent is one of the most diverse boroughs in the UK. To work effectively in such a diverse setting, we need a good understanding of all our communities.

The equality characteristics have an important influence on the changing identities and needs of local people. This is part of a series of profiles that provide an overview of the diversity of our service users and residents. They will be used to:

- ensure best quality services that are appropriate for our local communities
- identify any gaps in service use or outcomes
- demonstrate where our services are working effectively
- check who could be affected by changes to policies or services
- measure the effects of the council's decisions on local people.


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Data notes

These diversity profiles bring together information from the 2011 Census and other data sources about the demographic, social and economic characteristics of the local population across the borough, including:

- age
- sex
- disability and health
- ethnicity
- religion or belief
- income status.

We benchmark census data for Brent against England and Wales, London, Inner London and Outer London and data from other sources against London and Great Britain. There may be differences between 2011 Census data and data more recently collected by service areas.



Executive summary

The 2011 census showed that:

- The population of Sudbury increased by 2,642 persons, or 21.5%, from 12,308 in 2001 to 14,950 in 2011
- The number of households increased by 2.2% resulting in an increase in the household size to 3.1 persons
- The number of 0-4 year olds increased by 37.9% from 820 in 2001 to 1,131 in 2011
- Sudbury has a 77.4% black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) population with an Asian population of 55.7% and a black population of 14.0%
- 37.8% of the ward's residents were born in the UK. 60.9% had a UK passport
- 89.3% of the residents in Sudbury had a religion.

Other data sources tell us that:

- the median household income in Sudbury is below the Brent median figure of £31,601 at £30,389.

The census did not include information about sexual orientation and gender reassignment. Stonewall estimates that lesbian, gay and bisexual (LGB) people make up 5-7% of the UK population. The Gender Identity Research and Education Society estimates that 1% of the UK population experience gender variance and 0.02% of the UK population will undergo gender transition.


Population

The population of Sudbury increased by 2,642 persons, or 21.5%, from 12,308 in 2001 to 14,950 in 2011.

The population growth was not uniform across the ward, although all but one Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in Sudbury experienced a growth of between 6.5 and 52.0%. One LSOA decreased by 6.5%.

LSOAs are areas built up from groups of Census Output Areas with the intention of being consistent and comparable over census periods. There are 32,844 LSOAs in England and Wales, and 173 in Brent.


Percentage change in population from 2001 by LSOA




Population

The population density of 70.2 persons per ha is slightly lower than the population density for Brent 72 persons per ha. Within Sudbury the population density varies from 39.9 to 115.0 persons per ha.

The number of households in Sudbury increased from 4,740 in 2001 to 4,843 in 2011, resulting in an increase in the mean household size from 2.6 persons in 2001 to 3.1 persons in 2011. Across the ward, the mean household size varied from 2.6 to 3.3 persons.



Population density (persons per hectare) by LSOA




Mean household size by LSOA

Age

The census showed that over a fifth of the population was under 18, 23.0% compared to 22.6% for Brent. More than 1 in 10 residents were aged 65 and over, 10.6% the same as 10.6% for Brent. Sudbury had a similar smaller working age (16 to 64) population to Brent, 68.9% compared to 69.2%.

The age profile of Sudbury's population was similar to that of Brent, with a slightly larger proportion of people aged 30 to 44, 25.6% compared to 24.5% in Brent; and a slightly smaller proportion aged under 5, 7.6% compared to 7.2% in Brent. The median age, at 32, was the same as Brent's median age of 32.

Median age for Sudbury, Brent, London and England and Wales




Sex

Men made up slightly over half of the population of Sudbury: 7,665 people in Sudbury were men and 7,285 were women.

There were 494 more men than women at age 16 to 64. The population aged under 18 had 157 more boys than girls.

Sudbury's population aged 65 and over had more women than men: 898 women and 679 men.

Disability


The proportion of residents who felt that they had good health increased from 69.3% in 2001 to 83.4% in 2011.

In November 2013, 0.8% (65 people) of Sudbury residents of working age - aged 16 to 64 - were claiming disability benefits (Nomis). This rate was the same as Brent, and lower than the rate for London 0.9%.

In the census, 1 in 7 (14.1%) Sudbury residents considered that their health had a limiting impact on their day to day activities. This is similar to the rate for Brent of 14.5%.

7.0% of residents felt their day to day activities were limited a lot and 7.1% of residents felt their day to day activities were limited a little.

Percentage of residents that felt their day to day activities were limited a little or limited a lot




Disability


5.3% of Sudbury's residents felt that they had bad or very bad health, similar to the 5.4% rate for Brent. Across the ward, the rate varied from 4.2 to 7.2%.

Disability and ill health varied across Sudbury. 7.0% of residents felt that their health limited a lot their day to day activities, the same as the 7.0% rate for Brent. Across the ward, the rate varied from 5.7 to 10.4%.

Ethnicity


In the 2011 Census, 77.4% of the population of Sudbury were from black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) backgrounds higher than 63.7% in Brent as a whole. By contrast, 14% of people in England and Wales and 40% of people in London were BAME.

The largest BAME group in Sudbury were the Asian/Asian British: Indian or British Indian, 30.9% of Sudbury's population compared to 18.6% of Brent's population, followed by Asian/Asian British: Sri Lankan: 7.1% compared to 2.9% in Brent. The White: English/ Welsh/ Scottish/ Northern Irish/ British population at 10.6% was lower than the percentage for Brent 18.0%.

There was a higher proportion of Asian/Asian British: Nepalese (includes Ghurkha), 4.2% people in Sudbury than in Brent, 0.9%. The Asian ethnic group percentage was larger than those for Brent: 55.7% compared to 34.1%. There was a smaller proportion of people from black ethnic groups in Sudbury: 14.0% compared to Brent's 18.8%.

0.1% of Sudbury's population were White: Gypsy or Irish Traveller which was on par with Brent, London and national figures.

Ethnicity by main ethnic group for Sudbury and Brent




Language



A 2011 school census found that 149 languages were spoken in Brent. The national census showed that English was the main language in 71.6% of Sudbury households. This was comparable to 77.6%, the rate for Brent.

The proportion of households in Sudbury where no one was able to speak English was 28.4%, comparable to the 22.4% rate for Brent.

Religion or Belief

More people in Sudbury had a religion than Brent: 1 in 20 Sudbury residents stated that they had no religion, compared to 1 in 10 people in Brent.

The largest religious groups in Sudbury were:


- Hindu (34.2% compared to 17.8% in Brent)
- Christian (32.4% compared to 41.5% in Brent)
- Muslim (17.9% compared to 18.6% in Brent).

The biggest changes to religious groups in Sudbury were:

- 184% increase to the proportion of Buddhist people
- 58% increase to the proportion of Hindu people
- 76% decrease to the proportion of Jewish people.

116 people stated that they were Jain and 144 people stated that they were Sikh.


Percentage by religion in Sudbury and Brent




Income

In 2014, the median household income in Sudbury is £30,389, lower than the £31,601 value for Brent. Within Brent, Sudbury ranks as the 8th lowest ward in terms of median household income.

Median household income varies within the ward by £9,419, from £25,768 to £35,187.
